

Pupil Premium Spending

The School receives an allocation of Pupil Premium Grant each year. This funding is specifically allocated to improve attainment for pupils who are eligible for free school meals and children in care.

Pupil Premium 2015-2016

Funding of £66,300 was allocated for 2015-2016. The allocation was used to employ five additional Support Assistants with a focus on attainment of disadvantaged pupils, throughout the school. In addition pupils in year 5/6 received additional targeted tuition which included one-one support from a Learning Support Additional Teacher. Pupils in KS1 received daily reading intervention support and general class room support.

A learning mentor was also employed to support maths intervention throughout the school.

The premium was also used to ensure that all children have the opportunity to attend residential visits including regular access to Forest Schools; also to support any extra-curricular class trips. This funding was also used to assist pupils to access music lessons by paying for extra-curricular tuition.

Overview of Pupil Premium spending 2015-16

Objectives:

To raise the attainment and improve the progress of those pupils entitled to the PPG.

To significantly close the attainment gap between pupils at St. Laurence's Primary and the attainment of pupils nationally.

To support vulnerable pupils and to provide opportunities to access the wider curriculum through by subsidising residential trips, music tuition and other extra-curricular activities.

As a result of the funding, disadvantaged children achieved an average point score of **30.2** (29.4 national other) in Mathematics, Reading and Writing. In KS1 the disadvantaged children achieved an average point score of **17.1** (16.4 national other). **July 2015**
